




*A new look, a new system for driver's licenses*



## DMV's Central Issuance Program

**C**entral Issuance (CI) is a safer and more secure way to handle one of the most important documents a person possesses. The Nevada DMV will no longer issue driver's licenses, permits, or identification (ID) cards over the counter in our offices. We will provide a paper interim (temporary) document which will be valid for 30 days.

**W**hen you come into a DMV office to renew your driver's license, permit, or ID card, it will be invalidated and returned to you. Because the interim document is *not* used for identification purposes, it will be important for you to carry the invalidated card along with the interim document until you receive your new card in the mail. The new card will be mailed to you from a separate and secure location within ten business days.

**T**he new Central Issuance program should be rolled out in all Nevada DMV offices by early November 2008. There is no need for everyone to immediately apply for a new card. As usual, you may renew your card within six months prior to its expiration date.

### Why did the Nevada DMV change to Central Issuance?

Central Issuance will increase protection against identity theft. The newly designed driver's licenses and ID cards contain many security features, making them difficult to counterfeit. Also, part of Central Issuance is a new facial recognition system that help ensures only one driver's license or ID card is issued to each qualified applicant. Central Issuance also provides more safety and security. Other states have reported greater safety and security for customers, DMV employees and equipment since implementing Central Issuance.
